Dear Friend

Every Advent a lovely friend of mine used to give me a poinsettia plant and every year by Christmas Eve the plant had given up the ghost and wilted and died. It didn't matter what I did – nothing kept it alive. My friend knew this but she faithfully continued to turn up on my doorstep at the beginning of December year on year and present me with a beautiful plant. My friend died a number of years ago now but I have continued to place a poinsettia somewhere in the house every Advent since. And that's because it was my lovely friend who told me this Mexican legend about the first poinsettia plants.

There were once two little children, Pepita and her cousin, Pedro. They loved the Christmas parades and parties in the days leading up to Christmas but, being poor, they never had money to buy presents. They especially wished that they could have something to offer to the Baby Jesus in the large manger scene inside the village church.

One Christmas Eve, the two poor children set out for the church empty handed as usual, to watch as many of the other children brought their fine gifts to the Christ Child in his manger. As they got closer to church, however, little Pepita grew desperate because she had no gift, and, kneeling down by the side of the road, she picked a handful of scraggly weeds, which she made into a bouquet. She was ashamed of her gift as she entered the little village church, but Pedro tried to comfort his cousin by saying, "You know, Pepita, that even the most humble gift, if you give it out of love, will be acceptable in his eyes."

Of course, Pepita was teased by other children when they saw her pathetic gift. But she kept silent, knowing that this was the best she could do. As she walked towards the altar where the manger scene was set up, she remembered Pedro's kind words: "You know, Pepita, that even the most humble gift, if you give it out of love, will be acceptable in his eyes." Then she knelt and carefully laid her bouquet of plain weeds on the straw in the nativity scene as her gift to Baby Jesus.

Suddenly, in full view of everyone in the church, the green top leaves of her weeds burst into star-shaped flowers of brilliant red, and soon the whole manger was surrounded by the same beautiful crimson stars. From that day on the deep red flowers would bloom each year during the Christmas season and would come to be known as *Flores de Noche Buena* – Christmas Eve Flowers.

The legend always reminds me that we often turn up at worship with little more than the equivalent of a handful of weeds. We may be distracted or upset, not really prepared for worship, and too tired to concentrate on prayer, but Jesus, who sees our hearts, transforms our pitiful efforts into a gift that is pleasing in God's eyes.

And then I'm reminded that there are times when I might be critical of the efforts of others – perhaps a job hasn't been done to the standard I expected – and I pray that instead of criticising the 'weeds' I can appreciate that they are in fact gifts. And that when all we can manage is a brief phone call or a card to someone going through a tough time and think we haven't done much, God takes those 'weeds' and turns them into the very gift that was needed at that time.

I pray that this year's Christmas poinsettias be an encouragement to us all to never give up, even when what we offer seems inadequate or the results of what we've done are disappointing.

Remember Pedro's words: "Even the most humble gift, if you give it out of love, will be acceptable in his eyes."

May I wish you, and all those you love and care about, a very happy Christmas.

I am aware demands on our goodwill giving becomes greater and greater as times are hard for all. However I am appealing for help once again.

Newcastle Foodbank has given three days food supply to 5820 adults and 3088 children in the past twelve months, which equates to 68,992 kilogrammes of food providing 164,267 meals.

At the moment we have 66 organisations on our system who refer clients to us, having determined them as someone in crisis. **No one is given food without that assessment.**

£40,000 was spent on buying food in the past twelve months to supplement your generous donations. Sadly this is not sustainable long term, hence this appeal.

Would you consider giving one item a week to help us to help those less fortunate than ourselves?

Or, if it is more convenient to you, can you help us financially on a regular or one-off basis?

We would love to hear from you if you want to know more.

I leave you with a few ideas as to what you may be able to contribute but it is not a comprehensive list. As we lead into the Christmas period you may want to donate items for Christmas Day lunch.

Toiletries, including nappies






