Happy New Year Everyone - So here it is January 2026!

I wonder how it feels to be at the start of this new year. For some it might feel like time has flown by, for others it might feel like time is crawling along. It's strange that we talk of time in such terms when we know it always moves forward at the same pace, but it can feel very different can't it? For some there will be anticipation and excitement about this year and what lays ahead, for others there might be concern, or worry. I know I've spoken to some who've said they are hoping for a better year ahead, maybe you wonder what this year might hold for you? Maybe you have a clear idea and know what it will hold; a significant birthday to look forward to (or dread), an anticipated birth, a special occasion, that long awaiting retirement or event... There may be other things we know about, that will shape the future but in ways yet to be discovered; medical tests, a job interview, or exams... In the great poetic wisdom found in the book of Ecclesiastes we are reminded 'For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven' sometimes we might embrace the new season, sometimes we might long for a previous time, but one thing is certain time will not stand still but God is with us!

This got me thinking about the life of our churches. I wonder how often we think of the different seasons, or of times of change within our churches, or how often we cling onto what we do, or how we do it? Our Christian story is one where creation and birth, death and resurrection where new life bursts forth are central themes, but sometimes we cling firmly to the status quo. I wonder instead what God might be calling us towards this year. In January we hold our annual covenant services, a chance to take stock and to recommit ourselves to God. I always find it a profound yet challenging service, I am however always struck by the fact that the covenant promise that we make doesn't come from nowhere but is in response to the faithfulness of God 'who was, and is, and is to come'. The introduction to the covenant service states this: 'The emphasis of the whole service is on God's readiness to enfold us in generous love, not dependant on our deserving.' So, whatever the year holds, may you know that you are enfolded in the generous love of God.

Eco Tips

Make Small Changes in the Kitchen: ditch plastic-wrapped items; try composting food waste and use homemade cleaners with ingredients like vinegar and bicarbonate of soda.

Go Green in the Garden: use peat-free compost; create habitats for local wildlife; let part of your garden grow wild or create a pond by sinking a bucket into the ground and try growing your own herbs to support pollinators like bees and attract ladybirds.

I am aware demands on our goodwill giving becomes greater and greater as times are hard for all. However I am appealing for help once again.

Newcastle Foodbank has given three days food supply to 5820 adults and 3088 children in the past twelve months, which equates to 68,992 kilogrammes of food providing 164,267 meals.

At the moment we have 66 organisations on our system who refer clients to us, having determined them as someone in crisis. **No one is given food without that assessment.**

£40,000 was spent on buying food in the past twelve months to supplement your generous donations. Sadly this is not sustainable long term, hence this appeal.

Would you consider giving one item a week to help us to help those less fortunate than ourselves?

Or, if it is more convenient to you, can you help us financially on a regular or one-off basis?

We would love to hear from you if you want to know more.

Godly Play as Bible Study at Cross Heath Methodist Church

Story is one of the most ancient forms of knowing. It is the way our Christian heritage has been passed down to us. And story forms the foundation of Godly Play. It invites you to sit as part of a circle and listen as the stories of the Bible are told through word and action. It allows you to immerse yourself in the stories as an act of meditation and prayer and ultimately to encounter God. As the stories are told you sit and listen and at the end of the storytelling you are invited to consider a number of 'I wonder questions'. Questions posed by the storyteller that ask you to reflect on what you have heard. Questions like:

I wonder what part of the story was most important to you? Or

I wonder where you are in the story?

Or

I wonder if there is a part of the story we can leave out and still have all the story we need?

There are no right or wrong answers to any of the questions, they are a means by which you are invited to wonder deeply about the story and what it says to you. Then when the story is put away there is time to respond to all that you have heard and wondered about. It may be that you want to reread the story again for yourself, paint, draw, model or write a response - the choice is entirely yours.

At the end of the response time we gather back together for refreshments before drawing our time together to an end. If this is something you think you might like to try then our next Godly play session will take place on Monday, 19th January at 6.30 pm at Cross Heath Methodist Church. Come and see, wonder, and reflect deeply about stories you thought you knew.

In these uncertain times it seems as though the world needs prayer more than ever.


So on Saturday 24th January 2026 you are invited to a time of prayer for the world and for peace at Wolstanton Methodist Church at 10.00am.
