Reading: 2 Samual 5:1-5 & 9-10

All the tribes of Israel came to David at Hebron and said, "We are your own flesh and blood. ² In the past, while Saul was king over us, you were the one who led Israel on their military campaigns. And the Lord said to you, 'You will shepherd my people Israel, and you will become their ruler."

³ When all the elders of Israel had come to King David at Hebron, the king made a covenant with them at Hebron before the Lord, and they anointed David king over Israel.

⁴ David was thirty years old when he became king, and he reigned forty years. ⁵ In Hebron he reigned over Judah seven years and six months, and in Jerusalem he reigned over all Israel and Judah thirty-three years.

⁹ David then took up residence in the fortress and called it the City of David. He built up the area around it, from the terraces^[b] inward. ¹⁰ And he became more and more powerful, because the Lord God Almighty was with him.

Reading: Mark 6:1-13

Jesus left there and went to his hometown, accompanied by his disciples. ² When the Sabbath came, he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were amazed.

"Where did this man get these things?" they asked. "What's this wisdom that has been given him? What are these remarkable miracles he is performing? ³ Isn't this the carpenter? Isn't this Mary's son and the brother of James, Joseph, [a] Judas and Simon? Aren't his sisters here with us?" And they took offense at him.

⁴ Jesus said to them, "A prophet is not without honor except in his own town, among his relatives and in his own home." ⁵ He could not do any miracles there, except lay his hands on a few sick people and heal them. ⁶ He was amazed at their lack of faith.

Then Jesus went around teaching from village to village. ⁷ Calling the Twelve to him, he began to send them out two by two and gave them authority over impure spirits.

⁸ These were his instructions: "Take nothing for the journey except a staff—no bread, no bag, no money in your belts. ⁹ Wear sandals but not an extra shirt. ¹⁰ Whenever you enter a house, stay there until you leave that town. ¹¹ And if any place will not welcome you or listen to you, leave that place and shake the dust off your feet as a testimony against them." ¹² They went out and preached that people should repent. ¹³ They drove out many demons and anointed many sick people with oil and healed them.

Sermon:

What do we expect a leader to look like? What are our expectations formed by? - our culture?, our personal history? Sometimes we make assumptions about people – they cannot possibly be leaders because they are too young, the wrong gender or from a different ethnicity. It's known as 'unconscious bias' and many organisations are now recognising that it

exists and are training managers and recruiters to be aware of their own unconscious assumptions about others.

If we look around our own world, we see that it is sometimes the leaders we don't expect who are shaking things up. Think of Greta Thunberg and the many young climate activists she has inspired. They are challenging the complacency and inaction of governments and refusing to be silenced. King David, despite his personal failings, was regarded as the 'model king' of Israel. In today's reading from 2 Samuel, we see him fulfil his God-given destiny as he is anointed and makes the city of Jerusalem his own. Yet we remember that as a young shepherd boy, he did not seem a very likely future king. But God saw beyond external appearances to the heart (1 Samuel 16.7b).

In today's Gospel reading, we see Jesus visiting his hometown of Nazareth, and teaching in the synagogue. But his hearers remember him when he was a boy, the child of Mary, the carpenter's son, and reject his teaching. They cannot see beyond their own 'unconscious bias' about what a leader and teacher should look like.

Think about the people around you. Are there people with gifts that could be nurtured and encouraged? Are there potential leaders in our midst? Ask God to show how you might be an encouragement to that person and resolve to do something about it.

Reading: Luke 10:25 – 37 NIV Introduction:

This is probably Jesus' most famous Parable and its very familiarity often prevents us from feeling its impact. A lawyer asks a religious question expecting a religious answer and gets one, but then seeks clarification. And in that he treads on dangerous ground! In elaborating on His answer, Jesus turns the question inside out and skewers the lawyer's self-serving hypocrisy. Everyone is our neighbour, says Jesus, especially those who need our help.

The Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37)

- ²⁵ On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?"
- ²⁶ "What is written in the Law?" he replied. "How do you read it?"
- ²⁷ He answered: " 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'; and 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' "
- ²⁸ "You have answered correctly," Jesus replied. "Do this and you will live."
- ²⁹ But he wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbour?"
- ³⁰ In reply Jesus said: "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he fell into the hands of robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. ³¹ A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. ³² So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. ³³ But a Samaritan, as he travelled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. ³⁴ He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, took him to an inn and took care of him. ³⁵ The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.'
- ³⁶ "Which of these three do you think was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?"
- ³⁷ The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him." Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."

Reading: Colossians 1:1–14 NIV Introduction:

At the start of his letter to the Christians at Colossae, Paul commends them for their faith in Jesus, which is bearing good fruit. He prays that they may continue to build up a community of love and mutual encouragement where everyone's needs are met. Today, we read some of the encouraging words Paul said to the Church in Colossae and think of how they may also encourage us today.

Thanksgiving and Prayer:

¹ Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Timothy our brother,

² To the holy and faithful brothers in Christ at Colosse: Grace and peace to you from God our Father.

³ We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you, ⁴ because we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love you have for all the saints-- ⁵ the faith and love that spring from the hope that is stored up for you in heaven and that you have already heard about in the word of truth, the gospel ⁶ that has come to you. All over the world this gospel is bearing fruit and growing, just as it has been doing among you since the day you heard it and understood God's grace in all its truth. ⁷ You learned it from Epaphras, our dear fellow servant, who is a faithful minister of Christ on our behalf, ⁸ and who also told us of your love in the Spirit.

⁹ For this reason, since the day we heard about you, we have not stopped praying for you and asking God to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all spiritual wisdom and understanding. ¹⁰ And we pray this in order that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and may please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God, ¹¹ being strengthened with all power according to his glorious might so that you may have great endurance and patience, and joyfully ¹² giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the kingdom of light. ¹³ For he has rescued us from the dominion of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of the Son he loves, ¹⁴ in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

Reflection: 'FIND ME SOMEBODY TO LOVE'

A popular current T.V. advert is for a bed company advertising singing mattresses, using the words of a well-known Queen song: "Find me somebody to love." The words of the song say: 'Can anybody find me somebody to love? Each morning I get up I die a little can barely stand on my feet take a look in the mirror and cry and cry "Lord, what are you doing to me. I have spent all my years in believing You but I just can't get no relief, Lord. Somebody, somebody, ooh somebody, can anybody find me somebody to love? I work hard every day of my life I work till I ache in my bones at the end of the day I take home my hard earned pay all on my own. I get down on my knees and I start to pray [praise the Lord] till the tears run down from my eyes, Lord. Somebody, ooh somebody, please can anybody find me somebody to love?

This song is a soul searching piece that questions life without love and a cause for deep, mental despair at the time he wrote it. It drives him to question God as to why, despite his praying and praising, something is

standing in the way. Perhaps it seems a strange concept for someone who holds worldly acclaim as well as unusual setting for a pop song; but it does underline an issue - not just important to life today - but something that lay at the heart of Jesus' ministry and teaching. Everyone needs to know that they are loved and that the love is expressed in practical ways.

The term 'Good Samaritan' carries a great moral meaning. It is a story which is so familiar that in some ways, it has masked the radical message of Jesus' Parable. Choosing a Samaritan as the one who shows 'love' not only surprises the confident lawyer questioning Jesus but also shocks the disciples. A little earlier in Luke's gospel, they had been turned away from spending the night in a Samaritan village and are rejected because they are on their way to Jerusalem. The hatred between Jews and Samaritans flowed in both directions. Historically, Samaritans were a remnant of Israel's northern tribes who were left when Israel fell to Assyria in 722BC. The remaining Israelites inter-married with the Assyrians, diluting their Jewishness, which is why Samaritans were viewed as a mixed race, causing hostility that had never been resolved. Hence, the rejection.

Here we have Jesus being tested by an expert in Jewish Law. He answers with a question of His own, testing the knowledge of the expert. He answers well: First, love God with all your heart, soul, strength and mind, and second, love one's neighbour as oneself. In one sense, he has answered his own question, but now Jesus directs the challenge - the question is not 'who' but 'how' should I love my neighbour? Jesus' reply in a Parable confronts the lawyer, disciples and all those listening with an unthinkable challenge. Jesus chooses His words deliberately. The road between Jerusalem and Jericho was about 20 miles and a haven for highway robbers. Bands of outlaws took advantage of the steep terrain and the constant trickle of travellers gave them a good living. Jesus describes the plight of the injured man. It may have been that the Priest and the Levite cross the road so that they did not break Jewish observance and obedience to the Law, despite the fact that love for the neighbour should have motivated care and attention. Yet the one person who had every reason not to stop was the one who did - putting himself in a very vulnerable position. He tends to the injured man, offered help, showed compassion and did what he could at the roadside; he administered first

aid and attended to his injuries before moving him to the safety of a nearby inn.

Then Jesus confronts the lawyer with another question: 'Who was the real neighbour?' There was only one answer, the one who showed him love. That must have hit hard! And even harder – "Go and do likewise." [v.37] The lawyer wouldn't have been the only one that day who left feeling very uncomfortable, literally, with their 'tail between their legs'.

A top priority for Jesus: LOVE. Not a noun but a verb; not a feeling but an action, and one which was to be an essential element after Pentecost as groups of Christians begun to form and organise a pattern for daily living.

Paul wrote one of his theologically and philosophically well-informed letters to a place that so few people knew about - Colossae - but the people mattered to God and Paul writes encouraging the new Jesus' followers in the city to stand firm in their faith and support one another in love. Inner peace and a personal relationship with God is different for each one of us. It is a gift from God which can so often be nurtured by others - a crucial part of belonging to a Church community. That was an essential role for Epaphras, who founded the Colossian Church. Colossae was a diverse population providing a melting pot of religious and philosophical ideas. Epaphras committed his life to serving the needs of others - his love shining through. Writing to Paul, who was that time in prison, he seeks advice on the best way to help this new community grow. Paul's advice mirrors what we read in Jesus' Parable - to show love and do good at every opportunity and as we do, we get to know God better. He meets and blesses us, and so we grow - not by living in isolation, but for God and others in a community of love and mutual encouragement.

We recognise, of course that it's a tough challenge by the standards of the world today which continually needs more 'Good Samaritans' and it is so tempting to 'walk on the other side'. There are many who have never experienced the love of a Church community. I wonder how that challenges us? I wonder how well we know our neighbours - the people who live around us, the people we meet, people in our communities? Then there are the people we only read about or see on television. How do we show our love to them? Like the song - do they need someone to

love them? The challenge for us is how we rise to our calling. The message for today has been written in love. **Amen.**

A Prayer Of Praise And Thanksgiving:

Hold a few moments to give thanks and praise to God, you might find it helpful to remember a time when you felt close to God or encountered God in a way you can't forget and give thanks for that experience...

We praise you, God of encounter and promise, for those kingdom moments in our lives that have been turning points; those encounters that have given us fresh eyes, new insights, warmed hearts; those people whose eyes have been so fixed on you that they have inspired us in our faith and in our daily lives.

We praise and thank you for all the ways you meet us in one another, and most of all we praise you for your Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour. **Amen.**

Introduction To A Reading From Genesis 18:

This is a wonderfully told story of an everyday encounter: travellers are passing by Abraham's camp and he invites them to stop for refreshments.

Nothing surprising there, except that the narrator has told us that these travellers are 'the Lord' passing on his way to Sodom. And the light refreshment Abraham offers is a full-blown banquet that they all eat together. We are left to marvel that, in this seemingly ordinary encounter, God is sitting to eat with a friend. How often have we had such encounters? The purpose of the visit is to reiterate that the next time they pass by Abraham's wife, Sarah (who is watching on from the tent and is past childbearing age) will have given birth to a child. Here, in a scene of everyday hospitality, heaven touches earth and God's purposes are moved on.

Genesis 18 1-10 NRSV, Anglicised Edition:

18 The Lord appeared to Abraham by the oaks of Mamre, as he sat at the entrance of his tent in the heat of the day. ² He looked up and saw three

men standing near him. When he saw them, he ran from the tent entrance to meet them, and bowed down to the ground. ³ He said, 'My lord, if I find favour with you, do not pass by your servant. ⁴ Let a little water be brought, and wash your feet, and rest yourselves under the tree. ⁵ Let me bring a little bread, that you may refresh yourselves, and after that you may pass on—since you have come to your servant.' So they said, 'Do as you have said.' ⁶ And Abraham hastened into the tent to Sarah, and said, 'Make ready quickly three measures of choice flour, knead it, and make cakes.' ⁷ Abraham ran to the herd, and took a calf, tender and good, and gave it to the servant, who hastened to prepare it. ⁸ Then he took curds and milk and the calf that he had prepared, and set it before them; and he stood by them under the tree while they ate.

⁹ They said to him, 'Where is your wife Sarah?' And he said, 'There, in the tent.' ¹⁰ Then one said, 'I will surely return to you in due season, and your wife Sarah shall have a son.' And Sarah was listening at the tent entrance behind him

Hymn: Have Faith In God, My Heart (StF 466)

Forgive us, compassionate God, when we fail to see you: in the faces of strangers; in the tears of the desperate; in the anxiety of the afraid; in the silence of the broken; in the fragility of creation; in one another or in ourselves. Forgive us and help us to encounter you afresh. **Amen.**

God of wonder, though we don't always see you, you always see us. Although our eyes aren't always open to the ways of your kingdom, it is always open to us. Although we don't always recognise you in our daily encounters, you are always there. Thank you for meeting us where we are, for your grace and forgiveness, and your life-giving Spirit, which fills us day by day. **Amen.**

Reading Colossians 1:15-28 NRSV, Anglicised Edition:

¹⁵ He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation, ¹⁶ for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. ¹⁷ He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. ¹⁸ He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. ¹⁹ For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, ²⁰ and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

²¹ And you who were once estranged and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, ²² he has now reconciled in his fleshly body through death, so as to present you holy and blameless and irreproachable before him, ²³ provided that you continue securely established and steadfast in the faith, without shifting from the hope promised by the gospel that you heard, which has been proclaimed to every creature under heaven. I, Paul, became a minister of this gospel.

²⁴ I am now rejoicing in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am completing what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church. ²⁵ I became its minister according to God's commission that was given to me for you, to make the word of God fully known, ²⁶ the mystery that has been hidden throughout the ages and generations but has now been revealed to his saints. ²⁷ To them God chose to make known how great among the gentiles are the riches of the glory of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. ²⁸ It is he whom we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone in all wisdom, so that we may present everyone mature in Christ.

Reflection Part One:

As with Abraham's visitors, so with Jesus – it is easy to miss the coming of God when he arrives in such an unexpected form. In one of Paul's richest theological reflections on the coming of Jesus, he talks about the crucified Christ as the invisible God made visible. Paul tells his first hearers that true authority and power are not found in the pomp and might of Caesar, but in the humility and suffering of Jesus. His point is even clearer if you read these verses backwards:

In verses 20a-19 (see also 2:13-15), Paul shows that reconciliation comes through self-giving, laying aside your interests to serve the needs of others. We see a pale reflection of this in people such as Martin Luther King and Nelson Mandela; but we see it most gloriously in Jesus. Then verses 17-16 point to God making all things new. All through human history our suffering king has been holding creation together even as we try to tear it apart; his suffering is not limited to the cross! And now Jesus remakes this ruined world, creates harmony, peace, new life and reconciles cultures; he invites us to be part of it, paying our price of entry through the cross. So verse 15 tells us that if we want to see God, then we need to look not at Caesar in his pomp, but at Jesus on his cross. It is as we look at the crucified one that we see the world-making, world-reconciling God in all his glory.

Our task in turn is to be those who reflect Christ, reflect God to others... As we embody the values of Jesus, we will encounter opposition but, if we respond with a servant heart, others may see the image of the true God (vv.25-26). And so Paul points to our hope (vv.28-29), which keeps us

going because one day we will be perfect in a perfect world (v.28) – that is the glory we hope for. We will not be the true image but the more we look to Christ the more we will reflect his love in who we are and how we live.

Hymn: Meekness And Majesty (StF 362)

Meekness and majesty, manhood and deity, in perfect harmony — the man who is God. Lord of eternity, dwells in humanity, kneels in humility and washes our feet.

Father's pure radiance, perfect in innocence, yet learns obedience to death on a cross: suffering to give us life, conquering through sacrifice — and as they crucify, prays, 'Father forgive.'

Reflection Part Two:

Archbishop Michael Ramsey said, 'God is Christlike and in him is no unChristlikeness at all.' We see that in Paul's words to the Colossians. Read forwards, they tell us how all the majesty and glory of God was somehow squeezed into Jesus. But read backwards, they show us that this is how God has always been, that it is in grace and condescension (that is, his willingness to communicate with humanity in a way we can understand) and his preparedness to suffer that Creation is held together and ultimately reconciled to him. Reflect on this profound meditation on the identity of our God and marvel at what his love has done for us. The God who loves us so much, Christ who endures even the cross to demonstrate God's grace for you and for me...

Points to ponder....

- Ponder that mystery, the wonder of Christ the image of the invisible God.
- What of God does Christ reveal to you?
- Where, like Abraham, might you catch a glimpse of God being with you?

Prayers Of Intercession:

(If using in a Local arrangement service you may choose to use a short response is appropriate after each bidding – e.g. 'Lord in your mercy hear our prayer us.')

In this moment, we bring our prayers and our concerns for others.

The world seems so full of problems way beyond our imagining and understanding. Emergencies seem to be almost daily and we move from one to another so quickly. But these emergencies are still there and people are still impacted and in need. Our prayers we bring knowing that even if we fail to listen to you, you always listen to us, you listen to our words, our silences, our yearnings and our longing.

For those in crisis this day, we pray that someone will listen to them. (Lord in your mercy **hear our prayer us**)

For those in poverty and destitution, we pray that someone will give them a gift. (lord in your...)

For those in pain and anguish, we pray that someone will offer relief.

For those who are hungry, we pray that someone will feed them.

For those who are thirsty, we pray they may be given clean water.

For those in grief, we pray that someone will simply be with them.

For those who are near the end of life, we pray that someone will hold their hand.

For those who are lonely, we pray they may be befriended.

For those who are frightened, we pray they may be soothed and calmed.

Lord, there are so many needs of so many people in so many places, we remember now...

Lord, these are our prayers this day, we offer them and ourselves. knowing you hear our every word.

Lord, hear us and bless those for whom we pray. **Amen.**

Reading: Luke 11: 1–13 NLT

Once Jesus was in a certain place praying. As he finished, one of his disciples came to him and said, "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples."

Jesus said, "This is how you should pray:

"Father, may your name be kept holy.

May your Kingdom come soon.

Give us each day the food we need,
and forgive us our sins,
as we forgive those who sin against us.

And don't let us yield to temptation."

Then, teaching them more about prayer, he used this story: "Suppose you went to a friend's house at midnight, wanting to borrow three loaves of bread. You say to him, 'A friend of mine has just arrived for a visit, and I have nothing for him to eat.' And suppose he calls out from his bedroom, 'Don't bother me. The door is locked for the night, and my family and I are all in bed. I can't help you.' But I tell you this—though he won't do it for friendship's sake, if you keep knocking long enough, he will get up and give you whatever you need because of your shameless persistence.

"And so I tell you, keep on asking, and you will receive what you ask for. Keep on seeking, and you will find. Keep on knocking, and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks, receives. Everyone who seeks, finds. And to everyone who knocks, the door will be opened.

"You fathers—if your children ask for a fish, do you give them a snake instead? Or if they ask for an egg, do you give them a scorpion? Of course not! So if you sinful people know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him."

This service reflects on the Lord's Prayer in the form of a discussion with God, interspersed with hymns.

Our Father in heaven:

'Here I am, God. It has been so hard to find time to stop. There was breakfast, then the children to take to school, the house to clean, the washing to hang out. Off to work, the traffic was terrible, got to work late, meetings all day, didn't even have time for lunch. You know how it is.' 'Yes, my child, I know.'

'When I got home it just started again. I know I could have stopped and prayed instead of watching my favourite soap but, God, I was so tired.....'
'Yes, my child.'

'Now, as I fall asleep, I remember you. I know you told us to pray but, God, I have been so busy. How did the disciples find time to pray, between fishing and rushing around after Jesus?'

'Maybe it was because they saw how stopping and having time to chat with me helped Jesus to check things out, and the return to his busy life. They saw what a difference it made and wanted that difference for themselves. You know that difficult meeting you had today?'

'....Yes....'

'Well, I could have helped you see a way forward, if you had let me.....I am your Father. I love you, I am here for you, always, any time of the day or night. Just remember, Jesus taught his disciples to pray because he knew it would change their lives. I want the same for you.' 'Yes, Father.'

Hallowed be your name:

'Oh, God!'

'Yes, I am here.'

'Jesus, not that again!'

'I am still here.'

'Why are you still around? I am not praying at the moment. In fact, rather the opposite. I am really cross. This computer will not do what it is meant to do.....don't tell me you know how to work a computer as well as everything else?'

'It was you who called me.'

'No, I didn't. You were far from my thoughts. It is the wretched computer that I am thinking about.'

'You said, "Oh God", and "Jesus". Sounded pretty clear to me that you were calling for help.'

'Oh God! So I did.....Oh no.....'

Prayer:

Faithful God, forgive us when we lose sight of what really matters;

when we get sidetracked by the trivial and the trite, the superficial and the shallow.

Thank you that you hear our prayers and our reassurance that we really matter to you.

You love us so much and long for us to be fully rooted in you, to rely on you and to reflect your forgiveness, grace and redeeming love to all the world.

'Well, I know that there are loads of things I do that are not what you would want me to do......and yet I still do them. Like the other day at the garage, I was so cross with that silly little man who was so pompous and full of himself, and I had a really good go at him for not serving me straight away.....'

'He did need to check his paper work before he served you. He isn't good if he is hurried.....he gets very flustered. He isn't great with words and numbers.....'

'Well, I am sure he did it to annoy me.....and he did.....and....well...'

'A little patience and a kind word costs you nothing, and it is those tiny things that go a long way to building my kingdom. I am not asking you to change the world, just change a few things in yourself. My message to all of you is very simple: just love one another. It is a great way to build my kingdom, and it will certainly help it come, here and now, where you are.'

'I can see how your way would make a difference, but it is so hard.'

Give us today our daily bread:

'God, I feel so fat. I have really stuffed my face today. I really should not have eaten that bar of chocolate. As for the cooked breakfast I had this morning.......I have pigged out all day.'

'Why do you think that is? Don't you trust me to feed you, both today and tomorrow. There is plenty to go around if everyone shares it.'

'Oh, I know there is always more than enough. It isn't that I don't trust there is enough. I am just greedy. I always seem to want more.'

'What about all those people who do not have enough food? Do you know how much they would like to feel like you do tonight? All you do is complain, and yet you are so blessed, so fortunate to want for nothing. Might it be better to say "thank you" for how you feel rather than complaining? It seems my children are never happy. Some are so hungry that they die, and my heart weeps with them as they clutch their hollow, empty stomachs longing for something to put in them. And those children who have much more than they need complain they have

eaten too much. Do you remember the last chat we had about my kingdom coming on earth, now? Well, here is one of those things you can do yourself to help build my kingdom......How I long for my kingdom to come here on earth, so that everyone is aware of each other's needs and shares their food.'

'So you mean no more chocolates, no more cooked breakfasts. No more.....'

'No, I do not say that. Some chocolate and cooked breakfasts are fine. But I also say be aware of yourself and others around you, and be thankful for what you have. Break bread with others, welcome them to your table – welcome them to my table. Unless bread is broken and shared, my kingdom has no chance of being built.'

Hymn: Come, My Table Is A Meeting Place (StF 581)

Come, my table is a meeting place, here I'm waiting ready for you, come and share, you are invited, come, beloved, I chose you.

Come, my table is a feeding place, bread, my body broken for you, wine, my blood poured out to save you, given eternally for you.

Come, my table is a touching place, hands to greet you span time and space, see my arms stretched out in welcome, this for you a holy place.

Come and meet me in this moment, taste and see this gift of my grace, here, the feast spread out before you, come, my child, and take your place.

'What, even Fred at work? You know how he is, so rude and bossy and.....'
'Do you remember that Jesus said you should "love your enemies" and "turn the other cheek"....?

'Well, yes, but.....'

'No, there is no "but". If you really want to live my way, and build my kingdom, I do want you to forgive whose who are hard to love, even Fred. To really be free from sin you need to be free from lying, hatred, revenge, anger, bitterness, spitefulness......Think of all the time you spend complaining about Fred, and getting in a state about him. All that time you could be my kingdom-builder. Try loving Fred, he won't know what's hit him!'

'Oh, God!'

'Yes, I know, I am here.....always.'

Prayer:

'Forgive us our sins', you taught us to pray.

And so, Lord, we seek your forgiveness for the sins of our hearts and minds and bodies,

for the sins of pride and selfishness and unforgiveness,

for the sins we have repeated and the sins we have regretted.

'As we forgive those who sin against us', you went on to say.
